Throughout the country, parents, teachers, and students alike have testified against the addictive nature of e-cigarettes and vapes.

Story after story portrays the nicotine laden invention as a blight on modern society and a threat to our youth. Initially, the device was made with good intentions, it was originally meant to help people kick their smoking addictions by using a sort of “weaning” method. However, the real question is how reservoir students are affected by this device?

Officer Hall, stationed at Reservoir, said that the popularity has gone down quite a bit from a year ago, however, the situation is far from ideal. He claimed that over time, more and more students had some sort of stake in juuls, and that was made evident by the sheer

“More kids were getting addicted more and more...” he said “...and cutting classes several times a day.”

This, Officer Hall feared, would show the early evidence of nicotine addiction, even though companies and local governments were all taking some sort of action to curb it.

Mr. McDuffie, Reservoir security guard,

also had some words on the subject.

“It is harder to track while [students] are vaping so they feel that they can just get rid of it without real consequence.”

Another reason he called juuling the biggest problem facing the school is because the rooms smell of fruit flavors and hints of bad breath after they are done, which can make it harder to track and fight as an administration.

Mr. McDuffie be-

lieves that their best way to combat this outbreak is for parents and guardians to spend time with their high schoolers and explain the dangers, especially doing it in school.

As can be seen from the experts on the issue, juuling should never be done on school property because not only will the school be held responsible if something happens, but it may disrupt the learning environment that Reservoir tries to cultivate. Addition-

ally, it could cause health issues that the school is not prepared to handle, like nicotine addiction.

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Allison Alston wins Howard County Student Member Of the Board: Reservoir’s First

On February 28th, 2019, The Howard County Association of Student Councils (HCASC), hosted the 2nd annual Student Member of the Board Convention at Wilde Lake High School.

At the convention, 132 student delegates from every middle and high school throughout county were able to vote on who they wanted to see as the two finalists for SMOB. Each middle school has gets three delegates (one from each grade) and every high school gets six delegates, at least one being from 9th 10th or 11th grade.

At the end of the day, the 14 candidates were narrowed down to two. Allison Alston from Reservoir HS, and Hannah Witkin from Long Reach HS. This was historic as neither high school has had a student

from their school be nominated to be the next Student Member of the Board.

We asked Hannah what she wants to do if elected as the next SMOB;

“My main message is about recognizing all students equitably. I want to reach out to underrepresented populations (not just the typical student leaders) about the issues which concern them. I want to help students find and advocate for the things they’re passionate about, as well as empower them to address these issues. If elected, I aim to create an advisory council with students from every middle and high school who can help inform my decisions. I also aim to use canvas to provide quick and easy access to resources to help every student identify

issues, speak up for them, and actually be heard.”

We spoke with Allison afterwards to find out what it’s like being a candidate and what her plans are if elected.

She said “[Going from school to school] is rewarding and it gives flashbacks when visiting the middle schools. [If elected as the SMOB] I really want to focus on mental health. I wanna have mental health awareness night, and I want to implement polling through canvas because it’s important to listen to all voices.” When asked about what changes she’d like to see, she responded with “the big issue I’ve been pressing is mental health. No one knows the answer to the resources that are available

except counselors. Also, if you’re a student of color, you are four times more likely to be suspended as a white kid for the same issue. We need to change the wording in disciplinary reforms. Being “disruptive” could be different for every teacher and leaves room for bias.”

Allison also mentioned how she wants to send messages through canvas with bi-weekly updates about what’s new and going on in the county, upcoming policies, etc. Lastly, Allison finished off by telling us who inspired her for this position.

“A group of students suggested I run when I was a delegate at the SMOB convention last year. Also exploring my career path kind of inspired me to look into that. Since we as students

spend so much time in the school system, we should enjoy it. If I can be the person to make their experiences better than I would want to be the person to do that.”

In March, Allison was able to meet some of the current Board of Education Members at the People Acting Together in Howard forum which was about equity and mental health awareness. She was able to speak with Superintendent Martirano, Chairwoman Ellis, and Board Member Taj.

Allison has one last message to RHS: “Reservoir, I want you to know me as someone who is willing to listen as best as I am willing to speak. I am outspoken, relatable and determined.”

Flextime fasco: county schools face changes

The student said in response to the administrators' handling of the unsafe incidents that "it is only a couple of kids then their behavior should be handled differently." The student was very disappointed with the way Gator break was handled and how it's going to affect the students. 
It's crazy to remember that Apple first released AirPods in December 13, 2016. These wireless, Bluetooth headphones weren't too popular when first sold because of the price (\$165). Because headphones already came with the purchase of an iPhone, AirPods went ignored for quite a long time. But with the arrival of the iPhone X and Xr which lacked a headphone jack, Apple made a huge profit on selling AirPods to consumers. Companies like Amazon are already inventing similar products, noticing the consumer interest.

If you haven't seen somebody wear them around school by now, AirPods literally resemble regular white headphones but with the wires cut off. The rectangular case is small and sleek, but it's easy to lose if you aren't careful enough. In addition, some consumers have complained about the Bluetooth earbuds, saying that it falls out of their ears and that there isn't much of a range when listening to music/talking on the phone. 
have that overlooked. And moreover, some people just aren't very good test takers.
